basking in the glow of our convention in April. You all did a magnificent job, and we are frequently hearing from people around the state about how much fun they had on the Menlo campus in April. You, your parents, Menlo Facilities, and Menlo School in general all worked together to put on a great convention for the Latin students of California, and for that I thank you.

As most of you know, we ended up making a large profit this year. We had a budget of \$121,847.24 from registration fees and donations, and we ended up with a profit of \$42,951.87. In accordance with the CJCL Constitution, we will give 40% of the profits to CJCL, and on Saturday at the state board meeting Natalie will hand over a check for \$17,180.76. In addition we gave \$1,251.24 to the CJCL Scholarship Fund from the Coin Wars and an additional \$1,000 we added from our income. We also gave a total of \$2,087.00 to victims of the fires both north and south from our snack bar profits. That gave us a profit of \$25,771.13.

So what are we going to do with that money? Menlo gave us \$11,000.00 of the profit for us to use as we see fit. First, we voted to earmark \$5,000.00 for Menlo's Financial Aid which goes directly to our students. Next we spent \$1,096.00 to take the families of the Redwood Family House to the zoo. Finally, the board voted to pay \$2,442.63 for 25 *Latin for the New Millennium* texts and 30 workbooks so that the inmates of the Correctional Institution at Tehachapi can study Latin with Dr. Denali St. Amand (who taught at the Menlo Middle School for 20 years). As you saw at the opening of the year, studying Latin has made a huge difference in the lives of the inmates there. Here is one of the quotes I shared with you in August:

I'd ...like to extend my thanks and gratitude to Professor Ms. St. Amand for the time she invested toward my efforts at higher education thus increasing my chances of success upon my transitioning back into society. With the successful completion of Latin 101 I feel as though... there is no goal I can't achieve. Wow! I actually learned some

Latin, and that is truly an amazing gift that will keep on giving. Thank you, and God bless!"

So again, thanks for everything you all did to make this happen. We are looking forward to a great year with more focus on us and no vacations or weekends spent in planning a convention.

His performance was outstanding; the audience even called for an encore, for which he played a jazz rendition of Mary had a Little Lamb.

Both Natalie Hilderbrand and Ava Ford dominated in sports. Ava competed in swimming, placing top three in four different events and winning 10th place in the Overall Olympika Contest.. Natalie competed in swimming and track. She won seven out of her eight swimming races and placed top three in both of her track contests. At the end of convention, she was awarded first place in the Overall Olympika category and 7th in Overall Sweepstakes!

this year's NJCL board! The first step to run was being approved by California JCL at state convention here at Menlo in April. As you may remember, I gave a speech at General Assembly at CJCL Convention along with the other candidates for office. I also took part in candidate's open forum, where I was asked questions about the CoCo's job and why I would be a good fit. Schools then voted either to approve me to run on California's behalf or not to do so. At the end of the California convention, when the new CJCL board members were announced, I learned that I had also been approved by the schools throughout the state to run for national office.

Between state convention and national convention, I had lots of work to do to prepare my campaign. I created brochures, flyers, posters and tags with information about me. I had only a \$50 budget for campaign materials, though, and had to be sure to keep track of receipts for everything I printed out, bought or used. Another part of my campaign was social media; it is free and is good publicity, so I didn't need to account for it in my budget. I planned out an instagram account and decided each of the posts I would share with information about my campaign. Candidates for national office can be disqualified for pre-campaigning before the end of the nominations committee meeting, so I had to be sure not to share any information about my campaign online before that.

At convention, there were many campaign events. The first was the Nominations Committee Meeting (NomCom) on the second day. This was the event at which the candidates were first announced. I gave a two minute speech there. Since there were three candidates for my position, a ballot was passed out to the voting delegates (two from each state), who then voted on which 2 candidates would run. All three of us were well-qualified and articulate, so I was thrilled when I was elected to continue.

After NomCom, there was Meet the Candidates. For that event, all the candidates gathered in a big room, and students approached us to ask questions and get to know us. This was a more laid-back event, and I really enjoyed it. The next step in the campaign process was giving a three-minute speech at General Assembly, including a brief introduction from a friend. These introductions are intended to highlight the candidate's strengths from a different perspective. Then there was the Candidate's Open Forum. Just like at CJCL convention, candidates are asked questions which

they answer on the spot. This event was the most nerve-wrecking for me, because I didn't know what they would ask. At the end of Open Forum, all the states met to decide on whom to vote. Throughout the election process, I spent most of my time walking around and meeting people and handing out posters and tags. That was my favorite part of the election process. I was able to make connections with people in California and in all the other states which, I am sure, will last a lifetime.

For the last few months since convention, I have been working with the other six national officers to prepare for nationals and have been attending to the duties of the National CoCo. Each of the seven board members are from different states, and it has been great getting to know such a diverse group. To any of you considering running for JCL office, whether it be local, state or national, I can't stress enough how much of a rewarding and exciting process it is. Win or lose, running for office is a great experience that helps you make connections with lots of people.

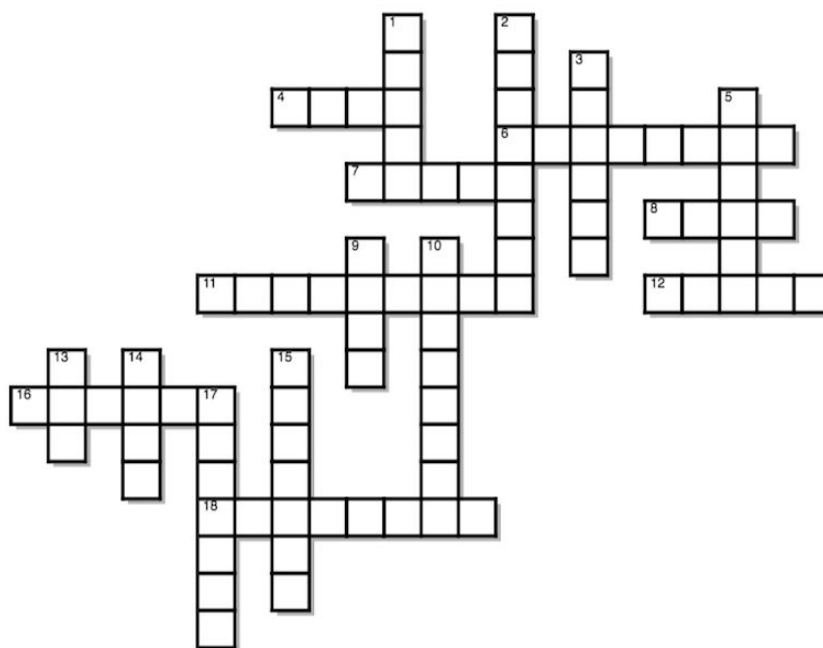
