The Halloween of Ancient Rome

Lemuria was celebrated in May on the 9th, 11th, and 13th, as even numbered days were considered unlucky. The purpose of the festival was to expel the ghosts of the dead, called *lemures*, from Roman homes. The Vestal Virgins would also prepare sacred salted flour cakes from the first ears of wheat of the season during the festival. It was customary to appeal to or expel the *lemures* by walking barefoot and throwing black beans over the shoulder in the middle of the night. The head of the household was responsible for getting up at midnight and performing the ritual repeating, "I send these; with these beans I redeem me and mine" (*Haec ego mitto; his redimo meque meosque fabis*) nine times. At the same time, other members of the family would bang on pots chanting "Ghosts of my fathers and ancestors, be gone!" (*Manes exite paterni!*). Because of this annual exorcism of the noxious spirits of the dead, the whole month of May was rendered unlucky for marriages.

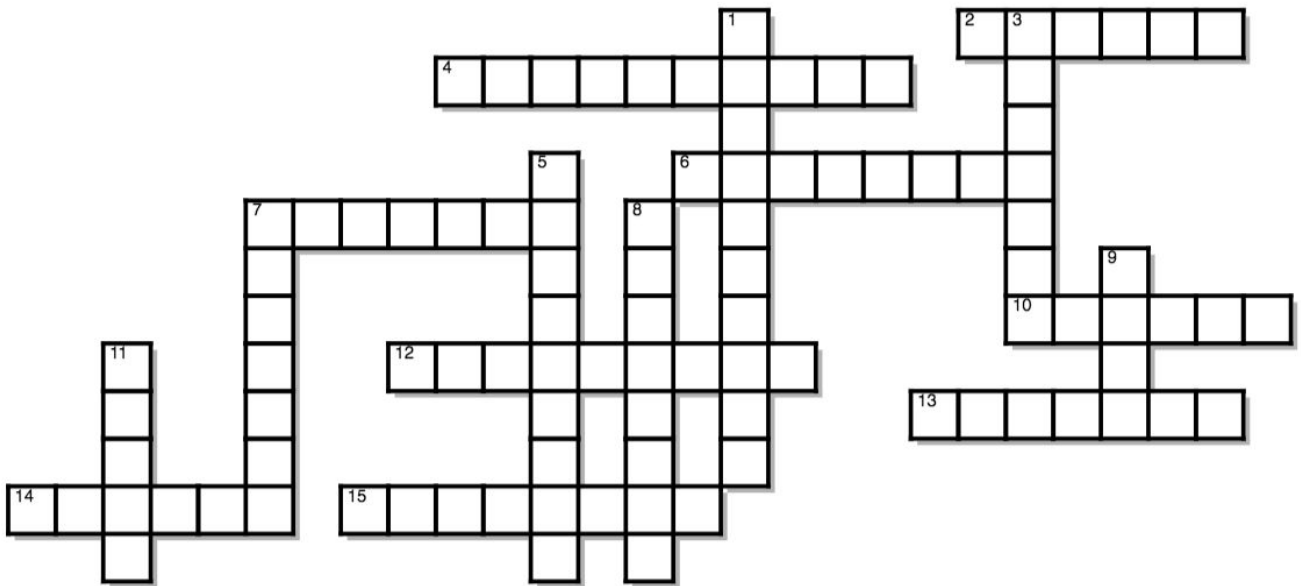
